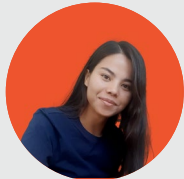
Meet the people who keep the school running

Habibi Center is a non-formal education project established in Greece in August 2016 and officially registered in the National Association Registry in Spain under the name Asociación Española Habibi Center (Nº 616525) in October 2018.

Mission

Our mission is to support young refugees in Greece through holistic education, life-skills training, and emotional guidance.

We aim to equip them with the tools and values needed for a brighter future while nurturing positivity, hope, and resilience.

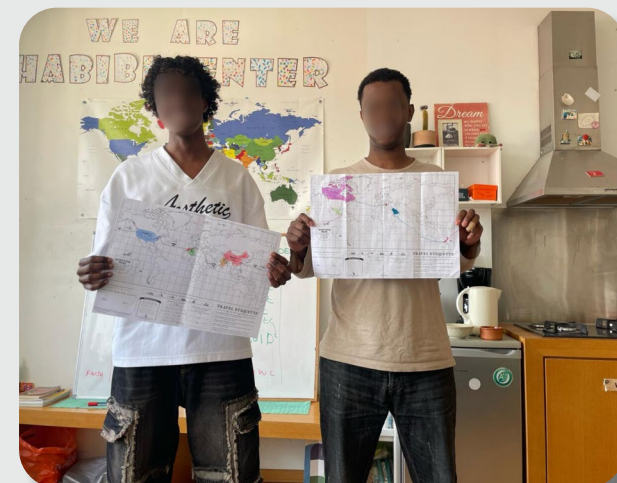
Learning English on an academic level

Structured and Academically-Based Learning

Learning English on an academic level is essential for our students. It enables young refugees to communicate independently, navigate daily life with confidence, and reduce reliance on interpreters. While communication is the foundation of language, our program adopts a structured, academically oriented approach to help youth reach age-appropriate school levels as quickly as possible and access the same opportunities as their European peers.

Many of our students have experienced multiple displacements and years without formal schooling. As a result, a large number arrive with limited literacy, not only in English but sometimes even in their mother tongue. To address this, our classes are divided by proficiency level, and lessons are tailored to individual needs. The early stages of learning require intensive adaptation and support, making this foundational phase critical. Achieving basic literacy is a prerequisite for entering any formal or non-formal education program, yet the number of illiterate youth in Athens continues to rise.

By meeting students where they are and guiding them step by step, we equip them with the essential tools to rebuild their lives, regain a sense of possibility, and pursue a brighter future.



Project Objectives

Learning English on an academic level

Curriculum and Exams

Once students acquire basic literacy skills, they follow a curriculum designed by the Habibi Center team based on more than nine years of direct experience. This curriculum blends established ESL resources, custom-developed materials, and the creativity of volunteers, ensuring a structured, level-appropriate progression for every learner. A defining feature of our program is preparation for official Cambridge English exams. Since July **2017**, a total of **147** students have taken these exams, achieving:

- **8 students at B2**
- **45 students at B1**
- **63 students at A2**
- **18 students at A1**

While **9** students did not pass, the preparation journey itself significantly strengthened their English proficiency, confidence, and personal development. We are currently awaiting the results for **4** students who sat for the **B1** exam and **1** student who took the **B2** exam in December.

These internationally recognized certifications have supported students' integration into Greek society, provided opportunities to interact with local youth during exam sessions, and allowed them to demonstrate their abilities objectively, regardless of legal status. Many students have used their certificates to strengthen asylum applications, access better employment opportunities, or pursue further studies at colleges and universities requiring higher English proficiency.

Through structured learning and internationally recognized assessments, we open pathways to education, employment, and long-term stability.



Project Objectives

Youth Empowerment

Empower to Grow

While many students initially join to learn English, the heart of our mission is youth empowerment. We aim to support young refugees in becoming confident, independent, and self-reliant individuals ready to actively participate in society. Our program builds both social and professional skills, helping students identify their strengths, confront fears, and cultivate self-esteem. Key components include:

- Values-based sessions that promote resilience and positive decision-making
- Developing social-emotional skills
- Self-discovery of interests, talents, and passions
- Basic computer literacy
- Creating professional CVs
- Coaching for job applications and interviews
- Exploring a variety of career paths
- Skills development for the workforce

These tools are essential for transitioning toward independence and long-term stability.

A Safe Space

Originally, the Habibi Center was an apartment, but it has since been adapted to become a set of six classrooms functioning as a community center. The educational supplies—simple yet functional—include tables, whiteboards, and a small library. The walls are adorned with motivational quotes, project displays, past art pieces, and a “hall of fame” featuring photos of learners and volunteers. This eclectic, colorful decor creates a relaxed, comfortable atmosphere while preserving the warmth and familiarity of a home.

The Habibi Center operates in the heart of Athens and has remained active since **2017**. Classes run weekdays from **3:30–6:30 p.m.**, allowing students to attend Greek school in the mornings or evenings while participating in our program in the afternoons. The Center serves as a safe space where young people can learn, connect, and envision a hopeful future built on education and community.

Resolutions and Progress

A Strong Start To 2025

Last year's resolutions (enhancing digital learning, strengthening the intern program, and broadening student support) served as a powerful catalyst for growth. At the start of **2025**, we aimed to continue the progress made in 2024 while adopting new priorities that further enhance the student experience and overall program quality.

1. Strengthen Core 2024 Initiatives

We remain committed to:

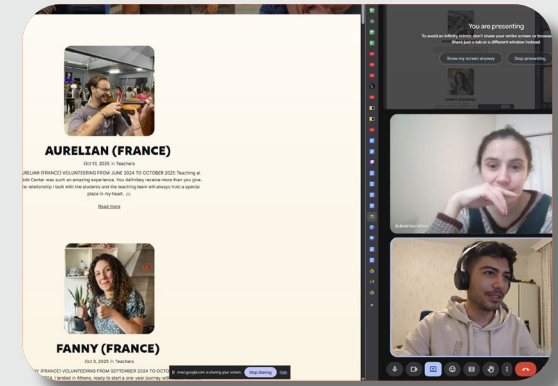
- Expanding Digital Learning opportunities
- Enhancing the Intern Program with more structured training and mentorship
- Broadening Career and Academic Support for both current and former students
- Continuing to Promote Reading through creative literacy initiatives

2. Improve Curriculum and Programs

This year, we expanded our programming by introducing evening classes that offer STEM lessons, reading comprehension tutoring, team-building activities, social-emotional learning, social-skills games, and Zentangle sessions designed to help students unwind and manage anxiety. These additions provide a more holistic learning experience and support both academic growth and emotional wellbeing.

3. Invest in Team Professional Development

To enhance the quality of our programs, we introduced new training modules and encouraged our volunteers to participate in external seminars and workshops, offering financial support when needed. One of these trainings includes the iLearn (Innovative Learning Environment for Refugee Adult Language Needs) Program by Drop In The Ocean. Our commitment to ongoing professional development has strengthened teaching quality, improved consistency, and helped ensure that our team is equipped with the tools and knowledge required to best support our students.

Career Day

Expanding Horizons for Our Students

Career Day aims to help students explore future career possibilities by introducing them to a diverse range of industries and professions. This year, we hosted 18 guest speakers from diverse industries to share their expertise and inspire our students:

The impact of Career Day has been profound. Here is some of the feedback from our students: "It's good to hear people's stories and dreams." "It opens a door and see what there is out there." "I need more education to pursue any career."

Some students said that they didn't realize how many jobs there were in a bank. Marketing, legal, not just working directly with money. One student said that although a person thinks they know what they want to do, when they go to university they sometimes discover something else they prefer. Even if it doesn't pay well. Another student commented that they liked seeing how the career path is not necessarily a straight path. People can change their mind or take a break from study. It doesn't have to be a big rush.

By connecting students with real-world professionals, Career Day broadens their horizons, fuels their ambitions, and equips them to make confident, informed decisions about their futures.



Programs

GED

Unlocking Opportunities

Beyond our core programs, the Habibi Center provides GED (General Educational Development) preparation classes for students who cannot complete the Greek school pathway or who aspire to attend American universities. The four GED exams—Math, Science, Social Studies, and Reasoning Through Language Arts (RLA)—are rigorous, but with personalized lessons for each subject, students gain the tools they need to succeed. Earning a GED opens doors to new educational pathways and stronger career opportunities.

This year, we are proud to be supporting one student as she prepares for her Mathematics, RLA, and Social Studies exams.

"I first met Andrely when she was just 16, attending our English classes. After successfully completing her Cambridge B1 exam, she stopped coming to classes and began working. Five years later, our paths crossed again. This time, she reached out with a new goal: earning her GED, starting with support in Mathematics. We coordinated for her to begin working with Matthew, who guided her through months of lessons and practice. As she neared readiness for the Math exam, we started her preparation for the RLA. For a little over a month, I worked side by side with her on an intensive study schedule. Her commitment never wavered. Today, Andrely is fully prepared to take her Maths and RLA exams and is working on Social Studies with Teacher Inga. We are all working hard to get her ready, but she is working the hardest, and her hard work truly shows that there is no stopping her. Whether it's the GED or future goals like studying International Relations in university, there is no stopping her. I am just glad to be able to support her in her journey to greatness." - **Stephanie**

Andrely's journey reflects exactly why the Habibi Center exists: to walk alongside our students not just for a season, but whenever they return—ready to take the next step toward their future.



Programs

The Literacy Program

Focus on Literacy

It is hard to imagine being a refugee teenager—arriving in a foreign country where you don't speak the language and are expected to integrate, attend school, and study subjects like Biology, Politics, and Philosophy, all in a language you can barely use to say hello. The challenge is even greater for those who are illiterate. Many of our students have never attended school in their home countries, and they find themselves navigating these same expectations without the ability to read or write in any language.

For illiterate refugees, the prospects are often bleak. Many are pushed into hard labor jobs, often under illegal conditions and for wages far below the minimum. The inability to read a label, let alone a job contract, makes exploitation and being cheated even more likely. Illiteracy doesn't just limit job opportunities; it deeply affects self-confidence and independence. Someone who cannot read street signs or metro station names will lack the confidence to navigate a city alone, leaving them completely dependent on others. This is why teaching literacy is a cornerstone of what we do at the Habibi Center.

In our literacy classes, students start from the very basics: learning to write the alphabet, combine letters into words, and read simple sentences. It's a joy to witness their determination as they sound out words like 'birthday,' and the moment they succeed, their eyes light up with pride and excitement. Beyond reading and writing, we focus on essential communication skills, such as speaking to a doctor or asking for help in a store. From day one, students acquire practical language abilities to navigate daily life, as English often becomes their primary means of communication.

At the Habibi Center, literacy is more than just learning to read. It's about restoring independence, building confidence, and opening doors to a brighter future.

This year, 35 students took part in Habibi Center's literacy courses.



Programs

Penpal Program

A Year of Global Connections and Learning

Our collaboration with Mercy High School in Burlingame, California, had been so successful that we decided to repeat the program with them this year. When classes resumed in September, we got back in touch with them to launch our third edition of the penpal program together, starting in October and running for eight consecutive weeks. Each week, our 10 students introduced a different theme (school, hobbies, important people, future dream job, university plans, etc.) and the 15 students at MHSB responded. As there were more students at MHSB, we paired our most advanced English students with a pair of theirs.

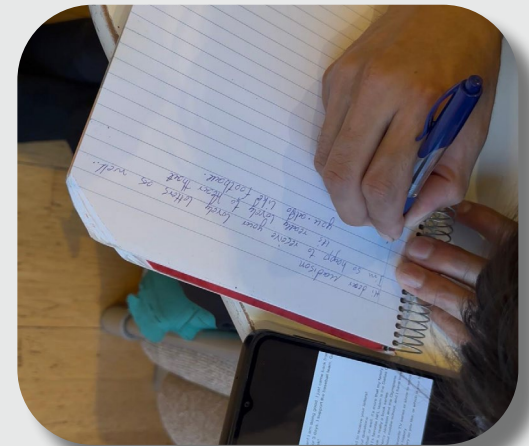
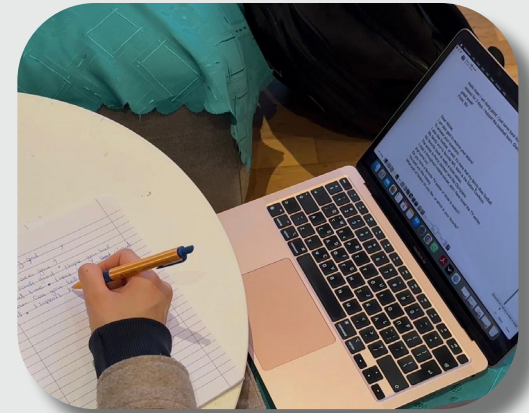
This exchange, which became routine for our students, was very popular with them. It allowed them to discover cultural aspects specific to the United States and to take a more introspective look at themselves, how they want to present themselves to strangers and what they want to highlight about their personality, as well as their future plans. It also greatly helped our students preparing for Cambridge exams to practice their writing skills, and we saw real progress in their letters throughout the program.

"I think having a pen pal is very important for students, because it helps us communicate with someone from another country in English. It improves our writing skills, more confidence, and lets us learn about different goals and different hobbies. Talking with my pen pal has helped me a lot practise and feel more comfortable writing English." - **Yasin**

Buddies Without Borders

Buddies Without Borders is a program run in partnership with a student club at Design Tech High School in California, USA. It is designed to foster meaningful cross-cultural friendships through weekly conversations between students from diverse backgrounds. Each pairing connects a Habibi Center student with a peer from another culture, creating a space to share experiences, broaden perspectives, and build confidence in communication. Through these weekly calls, our students strengthen their speaking skills with native speakers while forming genuine connections that extend far beyond the classroom.

Spelling Challenge

Raising Confidence

Every last Friday of the month, all classes at the Habibi Center come together for an exciting spelling challenge. We ensure students of all levels participate because we believe in the power of connection and peer learning. By hosting this recurring event, we aim to improve students' spelling skills while boosting their motivation, focus, and confidence during regular classes.

The challenge is tailored to each student's level. Students spell a word suited to their ability, and if they get it right, they advance to a more challenging word in the next round. To celebrate the diversity of talent, we select a winner from each class, ensuring that every student has the chance to shine, regardless of their English proficiency.

Teachers also join in, making the event a true community celebration and a highlight of the Habibi Center experience.

"A Spelling Bee is a simple and fun contest in many schools. In this contest, a student hears a word and then tries to spell it. If the spelling is correct, the student stays in the game. If it is wrong, the student is out. I think the Spelling Bee is very helpful. It helps me learn new words and remember them better. It also helps me learn a language faster because I practice reading and saying the words many times. For me, the Spelling Bee is fun and interesting. I enjoy joining it, and I feel it is a great way to improve my language skills." - **Iman**

Evening Classes

Support

Evening Programs: Learning, Connection, and Community

This year, we launched a brand-new series of evening programs at the Habibi Center, held every Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:30–7:30 pm. These sessions go beyond traditional classroom learning—they create space to learn, connect, unwind, and grow together.

Tuesdays — STEM Mini-Sessions

Students dive into science, technology, and math through hands-on experiments, creative challenges, and real-world problem-solving.

Wednesdays — Reading Lab

Students select a book and partner with teachers to explore stories, build vocabulary, and strengthen reading comprehension in a supportive, one-on-one environment.

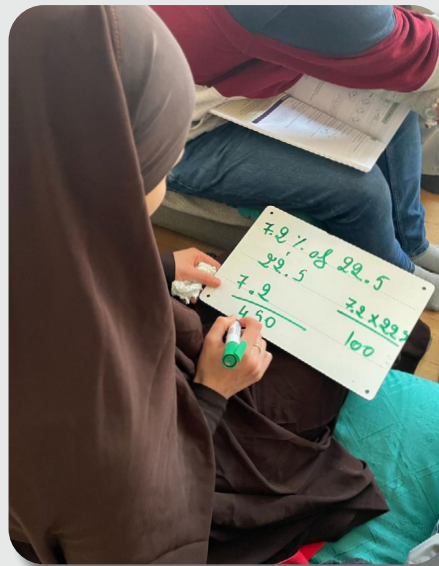

Support

Thursdays — Community-Building Activities

Through group games and dynamic activities, students practice teamwork, develop social and leadership skills, and strengthen our sense of community and belonging.

Fridays — Art & Zentangle

Using calming zentangle techniques, Fridays offer a creative space for students—and teachers—to unwind, de-stress, and express themselves at the end of a long week.

The University Preparation Course

Preparing Habibi Students for the next step

We launched this program after a student approached us for help, struggling to keep up with the rigor and academic expectations of university-level studies. In response, we created the University Preparation Program to bridge this gap and ensure that no student faces higher education alone.

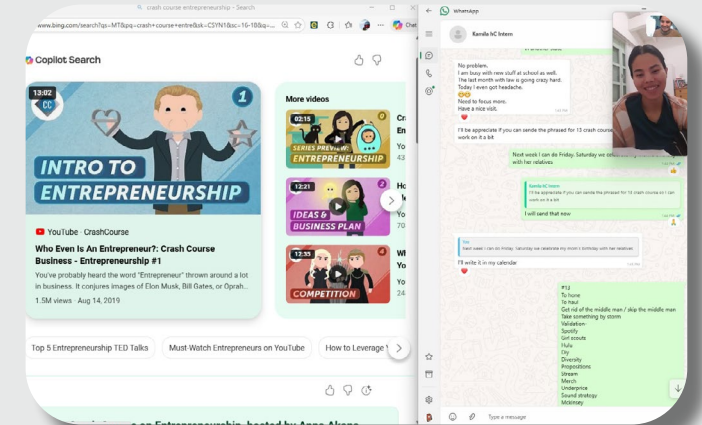
Unlike our other classes, this course is fully personalized and tailored to each learner's academic needs. Through weekly sessions, students strengthen their skills in text comprehension, grammar, presentation delivery, research, and academic writing. The goal is to equip students with the linguistic competence, study strategies, and confidence necessary to succeed in higher education.

We also support learners who must meet specific language or academic qualifications to gain admission to university programs, including preparation for standardized English exams.

This year, we provided online academic support to four students pursuing higher education in Psychology, International Education, Business and Entrepreneurship, and B2 English exam preparation for university entrance requirements.

"One of my favorite days of the week is when I get to have a call with Kamila. We are going through the Crash Course videos on Entrepreneurship, and we review the terms and ideas from each one. We talk about things like a business strategy and business models, elevator pitches, and how words and colors are carefully chosen in marketing because they evoke different feelings. We both learn a lot. It is always a pleasure to speak with someone so bright, so inquisitive, and so diligent in her studies. I finish each call feeling excited for her future. Whatever business she starts, it's going to be a good one."

Teacher Training and Development Program

Equipping Teachers

In **2023**, after a student requested to be trained as a teacher, the Habibi Center launched the “Teacher Training and Development Program,” a special project designed for volunteers without a teaching background and for advanced students who are interested in becoming a teacher at the Habibi Center. The aim of the program is to equip future teachers with the essential skills and knowledge needed for an effective teaching journey.

The content of the program is based on the book ‘Learning Teaching’ from Jim Scrivener and content from the official **ESL** course. Since some of the content from this literature does not align with the context of teaching at the Habibi Center, we decided to combine it with practical knowledge from our collective teaching experience. The course is divided into **8** units, including classroom management, lesson planning, productive and receptive skills, teaching grammar and classroom activities, and includes class observation time and journaling. The participants are also encouraged to incorporate the new information and tips in their own classes and discuss their progress in the following sessions.

This year, **10** volunteers took part in this course. Here is a snip bit of their experiences in this program:

“I really recommend it to volunteers. I thought Sarah put a lot of effort into it. Each time she taught us that alone was a demonstration. It really changed the way we taught, all of us, it affected how we taught.”

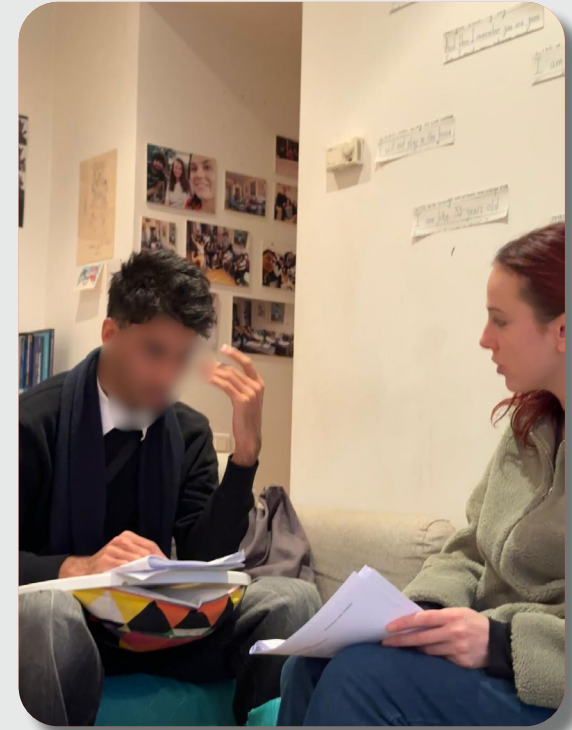
Adulting

Mastering Life Skills

Year after year, turning **18** has become an increasingly daunting challenge for unaccompanied minors. Changes in Greek laws have heightened anxiety and uncertainty among students, leaving many unsure about their future after aging out of shelters. In response, the Habibi Center launched the Adulting Workshop in **2024**, a vital program designed to support young refugees as they transition into independent adulthood.

Over four days, this workshop equips participants with essential life skills to foster self-reliance and success. It tackles critical topics such as navigating legal and financial responsibilities, managing time effectively, and accessing educational opportunities for integration. Through hands-on sessions, participants learn to budget, plan meals, cook, and maintain hygiene in their daily routines. The workshop also covers health practices, cleaning techniques, and laundry management—skills that prepare them for the realities of living independently.

This year, 4 students participated in Adulting workshops.

Through this workshop, students not only strengthen essential communication and teamwork skills but also build confidence in expressing themselves. Participants learned to craft compelling narratives, refine their ideas, and collaborate to bring their shared vision to life.

The magazine is more than a collection of stories and artwork—it is a celebration of our students' resilience, creativity, and vibrant community spirit. The Editors Workshop reflects **Habibi Center's commitment to empowering young refugees** by providing meaningful opportunities to learn, connect, and share their journeys with the world.

Employability

Building Futures

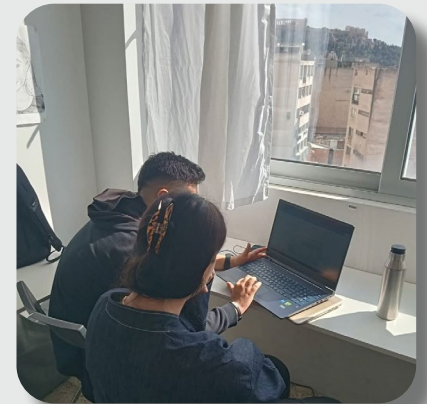
Many Habibi Center students face the need to secure employment shortly after turning 18 and transitioning into independent living. The workshop is designed to meet this need by:

- **Equipping participants with practical employability skills**
- **Helping them understand the Greek job market and application requirements**
- **Building confidence in presenting themselves professionally**
- **Supporting them in identifying realistic career goals and planning their next steps**

A key element of the workshop's success is the personalised support provided to each participant. Volunteers work with students on a one-to-one basis, creating a safe and supportive space for them to reflect on their strengths, interests, and future aspirations. These individual conversations are essential, as many students are still exploring their identity, goals, and professional direction. By taking the time to understand each young person's story, background, and ambitions, volunteers can guide them toward realistic first job opportunities that align with their long-term plans. This tailored approach ensures that students are not only prepared to apply for jobs, but are encouraged to take their first step into employment with purpose and a clearer sense of direction.

Delivered over four days (12 hours total), the workshop combines guided learning, individual coaching, and hands-on practice to ensure that students leave with fully developed application tools and a clearer understanding of their professional pathways. The programme remains accessible after completion, allowing students to return for CV updates, job search support, or interview preparation as new opportunities arise.

This year, 8 students participated in this workshop or received assistance with their CVs, LinkedIn, and job search.

Interpreters

Turning Skills into Careers

Our recent Interpreters' Workshop was a great success, equipping students with essential interpretation skills and opening doors to future career opportunities. This year, four students took on the challenge and completed the workshop, gaining valuable insight into the professional world of interpreting.

We were fortunate to welcome guest speakers who joined both online and in-person to share their experiences as interpreters in different contexts. Students learned directly from seasoned professionals, including court interpreters, asylum interview specialists, medical interpreters, and experts in psychological and shelter-based interpretation.

The workshop offered hands-on, practical training, enabling students with strong language abilities to develop the expertise and confidence needed to pursue interpreting as a profession.

"This four-week workshop focused on interpreting and marked my first experience teaching this subject. We covered the basics for interpreters and worked specifically on interpreting in asylum, medical, and psychological contexts.

I really enjoyed teaching the workshop, although I found it challenging to adapt such complex topics and specialized vocabulary to a B1 level. Despite these challenges, it was a very rewarding experience. It was a valuable and enriching experience."

IT

Mastering Technology, Unlocking Endless Learning Opportunities

Digital skills are no longer optional—they are essential for accessing decent-paying jobs and even for basic online job applications. Beyond workforce integration, these skills empower students to become independent learners, giving them control over their education and future. At the Habibi Center, we offer three levels of IT training:

Level I: Students build foundational skills like sending emails, creating documents, and navigating the web.

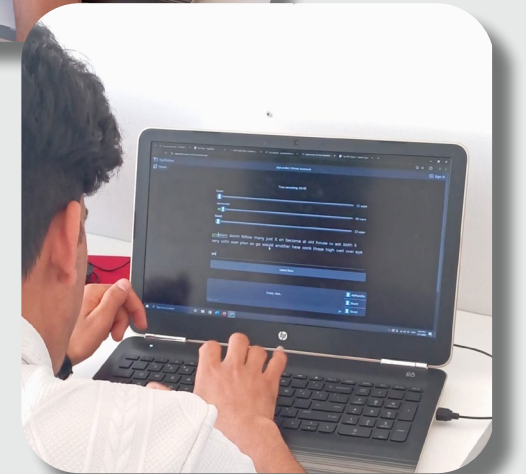
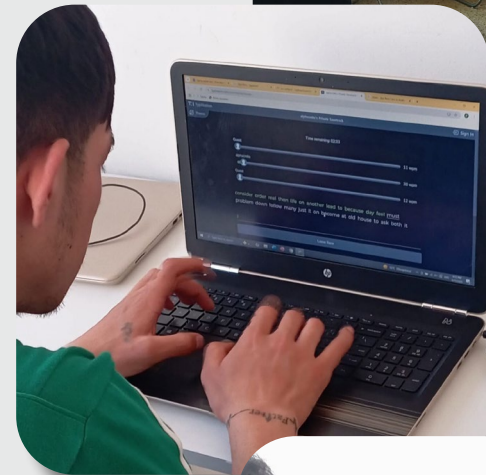
Level II: Students gain confidence by solving problems independently through instructional videos and learn to create a website. This level blends guided learning with self-directed tasks, with teachers available for support.

Level III: Students select official online courses tailored to their interests and goals, using platforms like Coursera, FutureLearn, and Udemy. Topics range from IT systems, advanced coding, and social media marketing to business management and accounting. This level emphasizes independent learning and applying skills from earlier levels.

Our IT program remains central to Habibi Center’s mission: empowering students to harness the digital world and take charge of their futures.

This year, Nima and Christian worked to strengthen the curriculum, enhancing the presentations for each section and refining the exercises students complete throughout the program.

This year, 13 students participated in IT workshops.

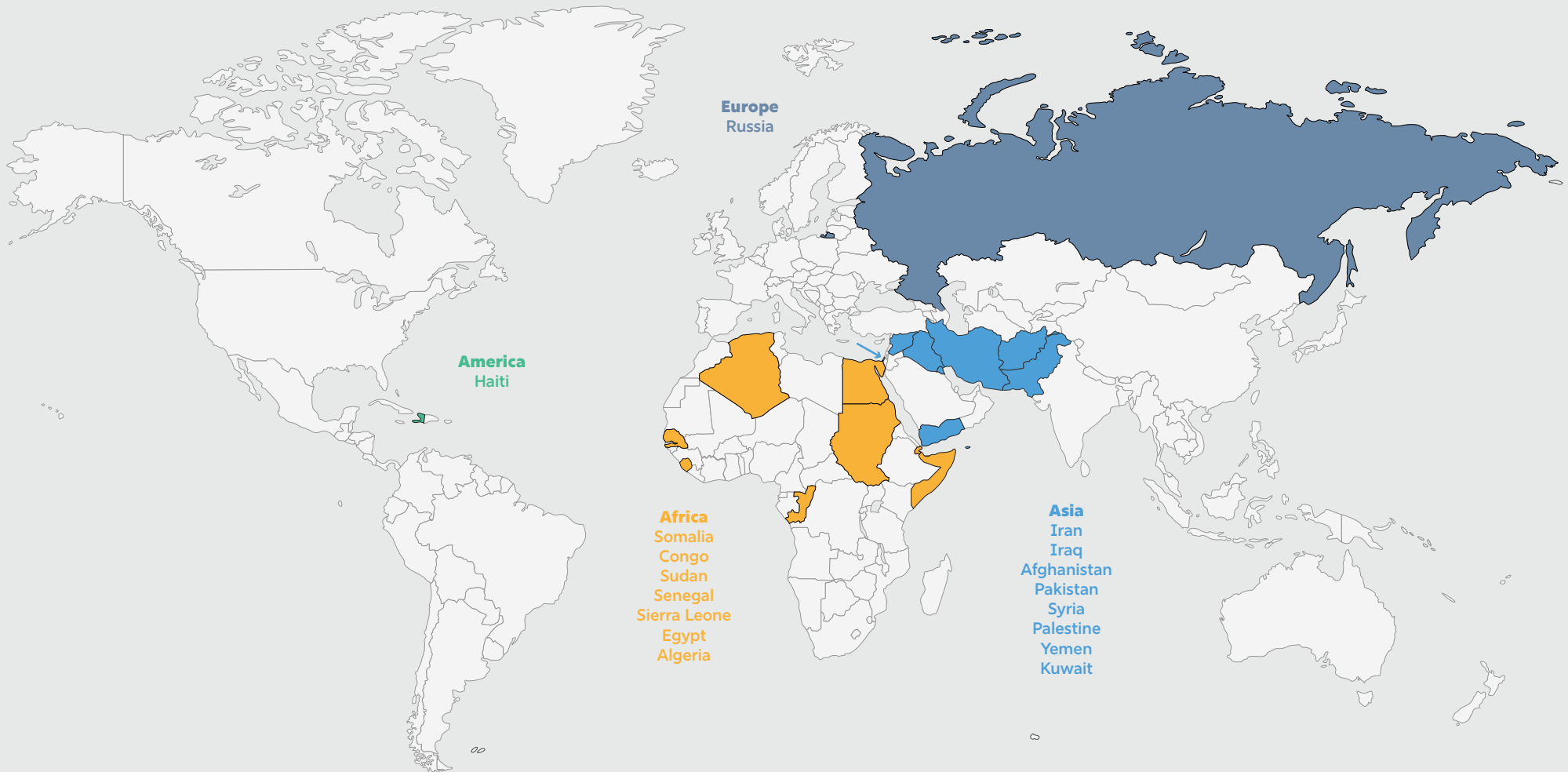

A big thank you to OCAS Orquesta de Cámara Solidaria for making this anniversary truly magical.



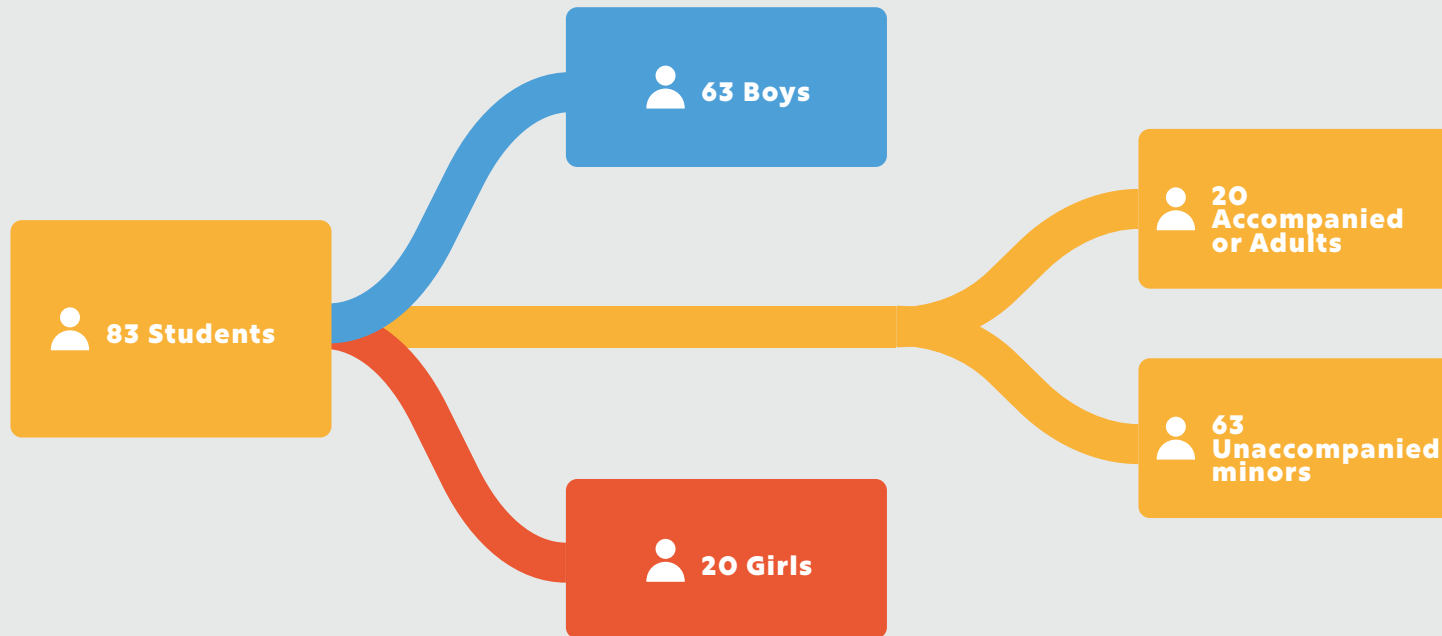

Where our Students came from



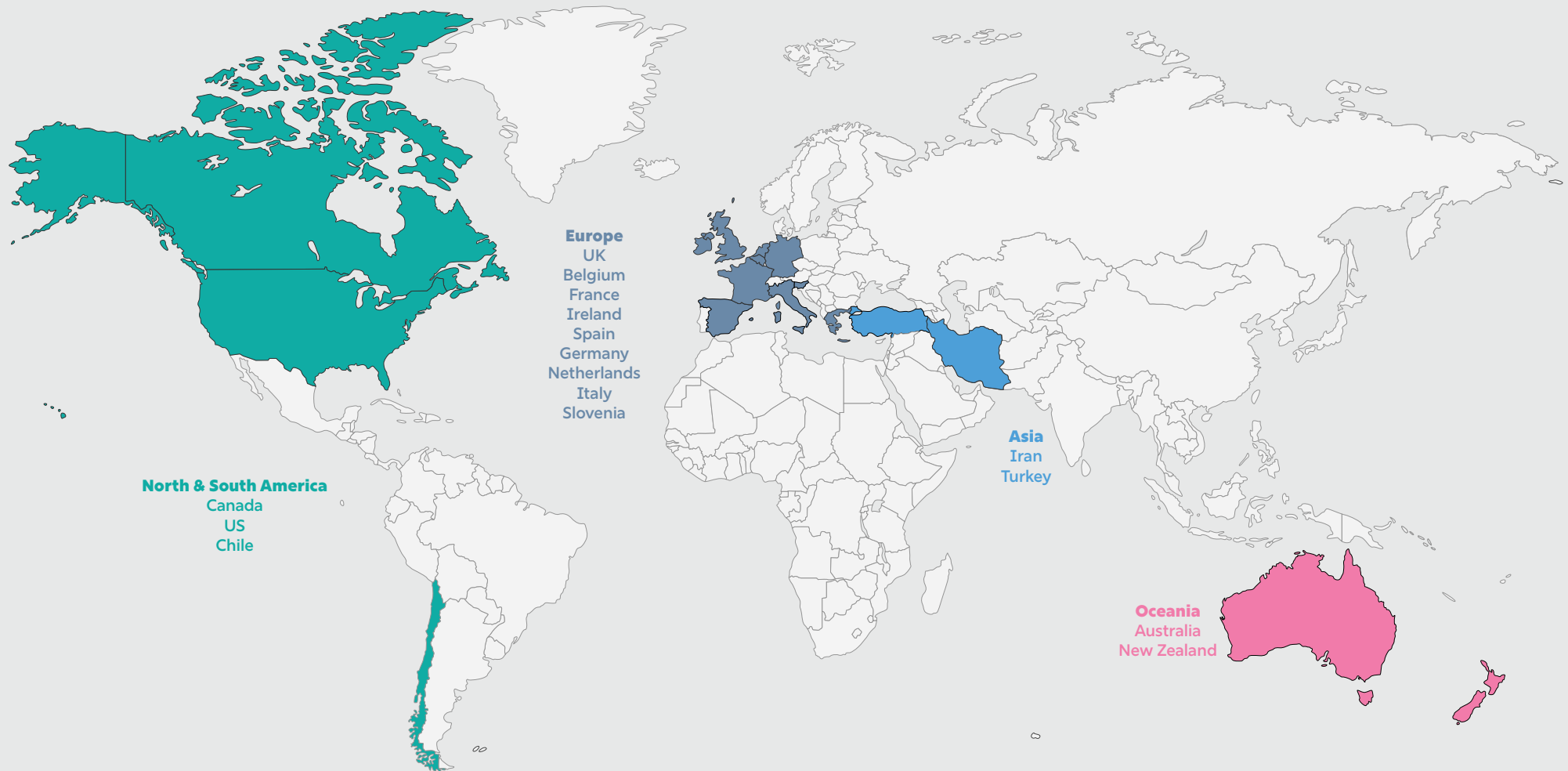

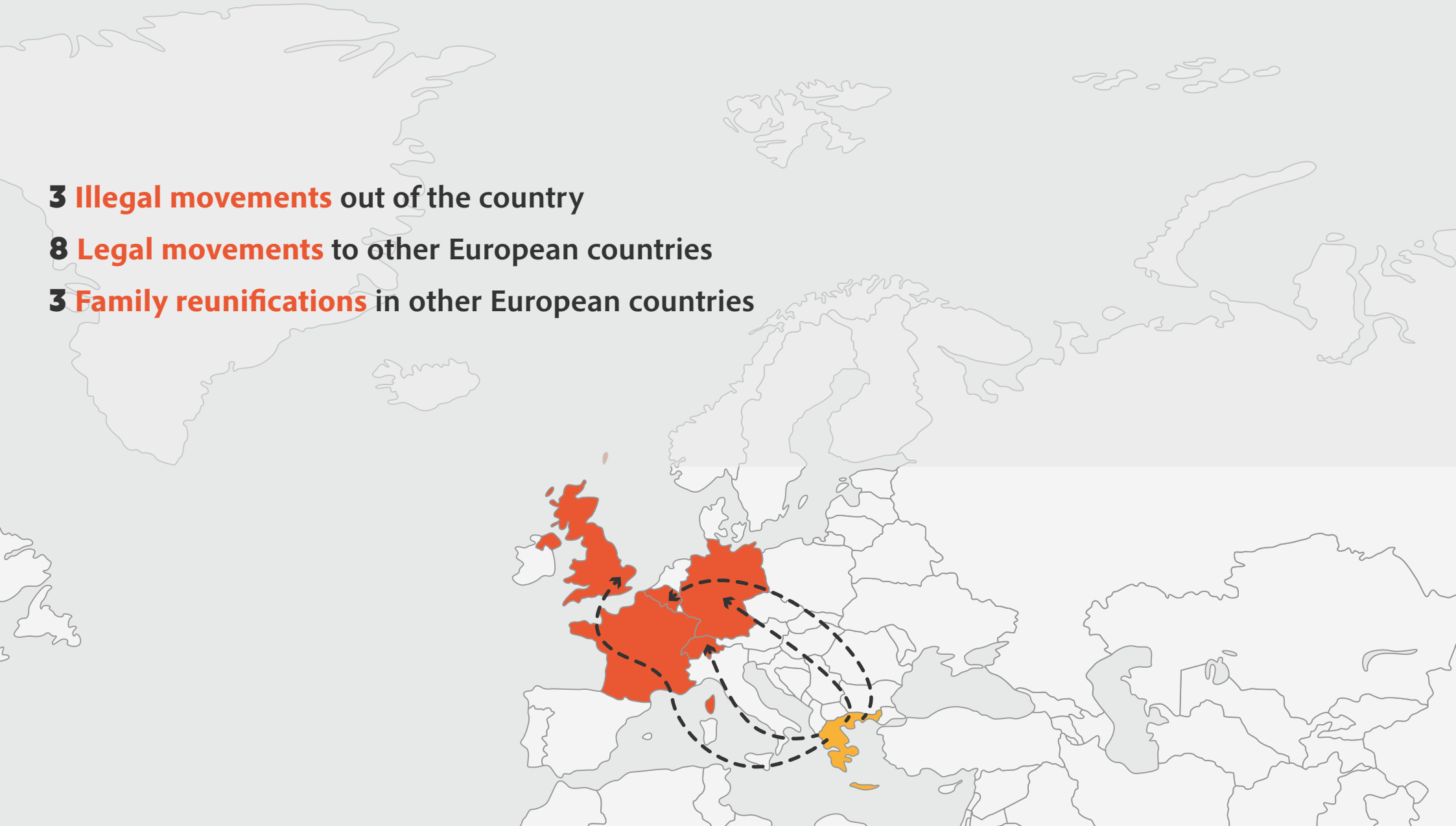

I’ve learned to prepare better, to understand where my students come from, to figure out how to pass on even a little bit of knowledge in a way that sticks. I’ve learned to balance discipline with passion. And I’ve learned that, well... I’m not great at everything. But more than anything, I’ve learned about attachment. That almost-instant connection. That gut feeling that pulls us together, even across different languages and experiences. Until. Until one of them disappears overnight.

I came to teach life skills and English. But I’m the one learning. And the lessons are so much bigger than language. Do. Go. Be. ”

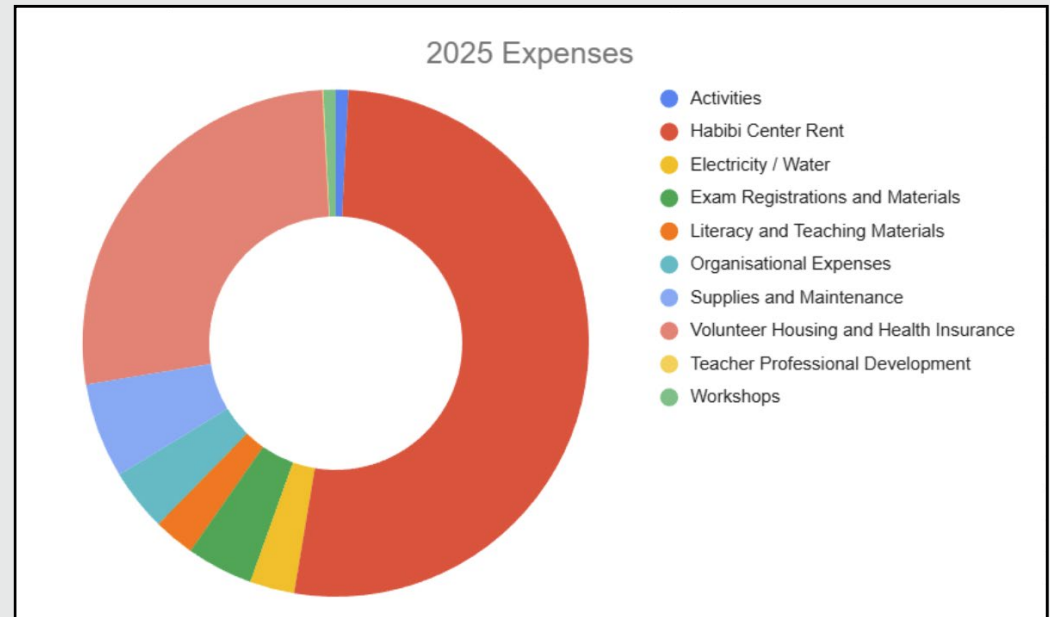

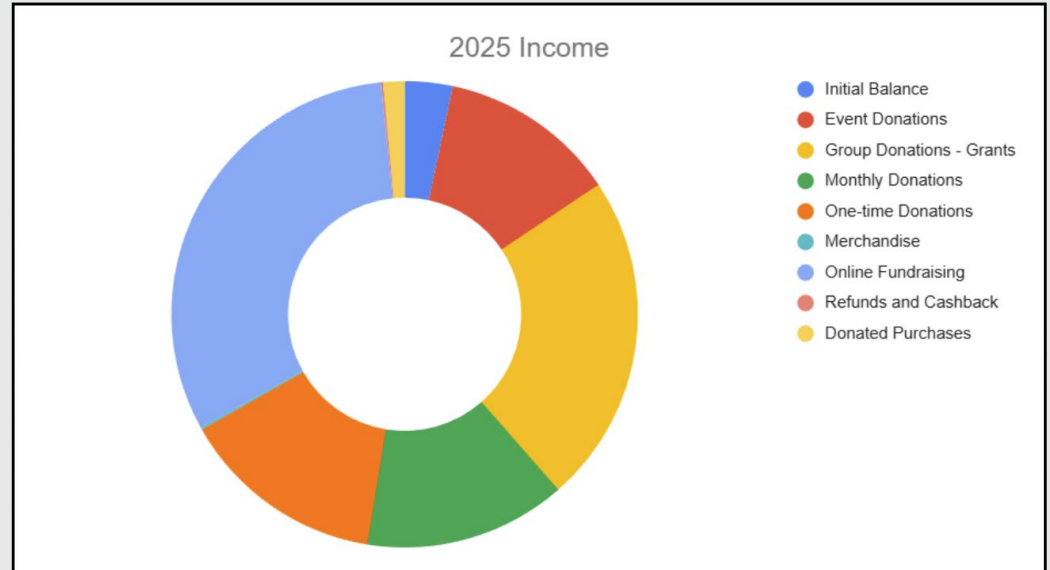
